# Music development plan summary: Wyvern school

This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

## Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

At Wyvern school we aim to enthuse the children in developing a lifelong love of music and helping them expand their musical skills. They will learn to work cooperatively with their peers as they sing and perform, developing their creativity, self-confidence and sense of achievement. Through our equality of opportunity and anti-discriminatory practise, we ensure that every child is included and supported during music lessons.

At Wyvern school, music is taught across all year groups, from nursery to year 2, in a comprehensive progression informed by the guidelines of the national model music curriculum (March 2021).

In nursery the children receive weekly music lessons of 20-25 minutes where they learn a wide range of songs including well-known nursery rhymes. They will develop their ability to move to music, play untuned percussion instruments in various ways and perform songs with their peers.

In early years, broadly using the Music Express scheme of work, we use a crosscurricular approach to our music tuition. The children receive weekly lessons of 30 minutes. They will learn a large variety of songs on different topics, exploring the various dimensions of music (pulse, rhythm, pitch, dynamics) as they do so. They will develop their ability to move to music. Using a wide range of tuned and untuned percussion instruments, they will create accompaniment for songs and stories. They will learn to play instruments with control and expression. Finally, they will begin to listen attentively to music and talk about their feelings related to what they hear.

In Key Stage 1, we also broadly use the Music Express scheme of work relevant to each respective year group. Our music is delivered following a cross curricular approach creating links with the learning across the various topics. The children receive weekly lessons of 45 minutes.

The children will learn to use their voices expressively and creatively by singing songs and speaking chants and rhymes on a great variety of topics.

They will listen to music from various composers and cultures. They will learn to describe what they hear using musical language (inter-related dimensions of music) and express their feelings and ideas related to the music.

They will compose their own music as they accompany songs and stories, using descriptive sounds and playing with expression using a wide range of tuned and untuned instruments.

They will develop their musicianship by exploring the inter-related dimensions of music such as pulse (beat), rhythm, pitch, tempo, dynamics, duration, structure, texture and timbre. They will learn how to combine those inter-related dimensions in their compositions and as we accompany songs, chants and stories.

They will use symbols/graphic scores to represent their sounds which will lead to learning to read basic music notation.

The children's progress is closely monitored with weekly assessments at the beginning of each lesson with flashback slides questions, at the end of lessons with plenary questions, with observations during lessons, half- termly video footage and quizzes. An overall grade is given at the end of each academic year concerning attainment and effort.

#### Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

Besides our weekly music lessons for every child at Wyvern, we offer the following:

- Choir. We offer the opportunity for our KS1 children to join our Wyvern choir. We hold free weekly session of 30 minutes taking place during the lunch hour. The choir is offered as a choice for all children, amongst other extra-curricular activities at the beginning of each term. A parent mail is sent out to this effect. Our choir performs for various occasions such as: during whole school singing assemblies on a half term basis and for our local community event Carols on the Square around Christmas time. We have also performed at the Milton Keynes Museum and at Foundation House in Wolverton.
- From September 2024, Y2 children will have the opportunity to take part in violin or cello lessons organised by the Milton Keynes music service. A parent mail has been sent out before the end of the academic year to this effect. Parents have to cover the lesson fees and the rental of instruments from the Music service. The lessons take place at school on Wednesday afternoons.
- During the Summer term we offer recorder tuition for our Y2 children. We provide recorders at a minimal cost. We offer weekly sessions of 30 minutes during the lunch hour on Mondays. At the end of the summer term the children perform for their peers during whole school singing assembly and also for their parents as part of the Y2 leaver's assembly.

## Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

- Weekly 30 minutes singing assemblies. Through our whole school singing assemblies, we aim to promote values of care and respect for all, the importance of cooperation and always trying our best. We encourage the children to be confident and to be a respectful member of our school community and society at large. We use a wide selection of warm-ups, chants and songs promoting the values we seek to practise at our school.
- Nativity play. Every year our school produce and perform the story of the Nativity involving all children at Wyvern. Each year group has to learn songs related to the nativity story and the whole production is performed for parents at the end of the Autumn term.
- Every year our Y2 children take part in the Primary Music Festival at our local Ridgeway Centre. This festival is organised by the Milton Keynes Music Hub. The children have to learn 3 songs related to different themes. On the day of the

festival, they are joined by Y2 children from various schools in Milton Keynes and perform those songs as part of the Primary Music Festival.

• Leaver's assembly. For their final assembly the Y2 children will present songs that they have explored during the year. The recorder club will also have a chance to present some music pieces to all the parents presents.

### In the future

This is about what the school is planning for subsequent years.

- Road shows. We were very grateful that The Milton Keynes Music Hub 's String Quartet came to our school this year to perform for our children. We would like to make it an annual event.
- As part of our weekly singing assembly, we have had live music played by saxophone, guitar and piano and we would like to provide more opportunities for our children to listen to live music. To this effect we will try to establish links with the music coordinator of our local secondary school to see if some of their music students could perform for us.
- Website. To keep you more informed we would like to provide more information about musical activities happening within our school on our website.
